**1.0 APPLICATION**

1.1 The Applicant is Townes Brewery Ltd

1.2 The premise is Speedwell Inn  
Lowgates  
Staveley  
S43 3TT

**2.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT**

2.1 For Members to determine an application to vary the premises licence in respect of the Speedwell Inn public house.

2.2 Relevant representations have been made and not withdrawn. The application cannot be granted or refused under officer delegated authority.

### 3.0 **CHANGES SOUGHT IN APPLICATION**

3.1 The premise is currently licensed as below

The sale by retail of alcohol for consumption ON and OFF the premises	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Monday to Saturday 10.00 am to 11.00 pm</li><li>Sunday Noon to 10.30 pm</li></ul>
Playing of recorded music (Indoors & Outdoors)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Monday to Sunday Midnight to 11.59 pm</li></ul>

3.2 These permissions are subject to the provisions of annex 1 of the current licence. The licence has not been updated for some time and has embedded conditions consistent with older premises licences. These embedded conditions include

- restricted access to bar areas for children
- reduced hours of operation on public holidays

3.3 A copy of the current premises licence is attached at Appendix A.

3.4 The premises licence variation application submitted and accepted on Friday 16<sup>th</sup> April 2021 seeks to alter the premises licence by

- Adding new types of regulated entertainment
- Adding late night refreshment
- Extending the permitted hours for sale and supply of alcohol
- Removing the embedded conditions in annex 1 of the current licence (which will be replaced by the current mandatory conditions).
- Adding new voluntary conditions to annex 2 to demonstrate how the applicant would manage the new permissions sought in the variation.
- Adding a plan of the premises.

3.5 A copy of the application form (with personal identity details removed) is included at Appendix B.

3.6 Due to the age of the current premises licence, no premises plan is currently appended to it.

The variation application includes a new plan which can be viewed at Appendix C.

The plan identifies the areas that are subject to the licensable activities sought in the variation application. This includes the outside spaces at the side and rear of the property.

3.7 The new permissions sought are shown in the table below

3.8 The application seeks to remove the "redundant" conditions in annex 1 of the current licence. These will be replaced by the Mandatory Conditions identified by the Licensing Act 2003 and subsequent legislation.

3.9 The application also offers a further range of voluntary conditions that will be added to annex 2 of the licence if accepted.

3.10 The Mandatory Conditions are shown at Appendix D.  
The additional volunteered conditions are shown at Appendix E.

## **4 APPLICATION PROCESS**

4.1 Applications for variation of Premises Licences are required to be advertised

- by way of site notice displayed at the premises,
- a public notice in the local press,
- by circulation of copies of the application to the Responsible Authorities
- and inclusion of the application details on the Local Authority website.

4.2 The public notice at the premises was viewed on 18<sup>th</sup> April 2021.

4.3 The application was advertised in the Derbyshire Times on Thursday 29<sup>th</sup> April 2021.

4.4 The application was submitted by e-mail. Consistent with current guidance, Chesterfield Borough Council's Licensing Authority circulated a copy of the application to the Responsible Authorities.

4.5 The details of the application were posted on the Local Authority website for the duration of the consultation period.

4.6 The statutory deadline for representations in respect of the application was midnight on 14<sup>th</sup> May 2021.

4.7 Responsible Authorities and Interested Parties (which includes persons or bodies representative of businesses or residents in the vicinity of the premises) are entitled to make representations to the Licensing Authority provided they are relevant representations.

4.8 To be "relevant" the representation must be made in relation to one or more of the licensing objectives which are: -

- the prevention of crime and disorder
- public safety
- the prevention of public nuisance
- protection of children from harm

- 4.9 63 representations and a petition with 148 signatures were received within the consultation time period and accepted. The content of the representations is divided. Some support the application whilst others object to it.
- 4.10 Two representations were received after the end of the statutory consultation period.
- The first was submitted too late and was rejected.
  - The second was submitted before the end of the consultation period but the email was addressed incorrectly and did not reach the Licensing department. This representation has subsequently been added to the report.
- 4.11 The representations come from
- Chesterfield Borough Council's Environmental Health Department (supported by an email from Derbyshire Police)
  - A Local Authority Councillor
  - A Chesterfield Borough Council Housing Manager
  - Residents and interested parties.
  - A petition from 148 individuals supporting the application
- 4.12 One of the representations has since been withdrawn.
- 4.13 Copies of the representations (with identity details removed wherever possible) are shown at Appendix F.

## **5 REPRESENTATIONS**

- 5.1 Any representation received must be relevant to the likely effect of the proposed variation on the promotion of at least one of the 4 licensing objectives which are:
- (1) the prevention of crime and disorder
  - (2) public safety
  - (3) prevention of public nuisance and
  - (4) the protection of children from harm.

Representations which are not relevant must be rejected.

- 5.2 If a representation has been made but is subsequently withdrawn it is no longer a relevant representation and provided there are no

other relevant representations the application can be dealt with under officer delegated authority.

5.3 The representations that have been made address all the licensing objectives to varying degrees.

5.4 The representations made objecting to the application include a pro forma letter of concern and individual messages which express opinions about the following matters

- A lack of consultation between the applicant and local residents.
- Noise nuisance. Loud music, loud voices and foul language already affect nearby residents. There are already reported breaches of the existing licensing conditions in this respect.
- Cigarette smoke from the outside consumption areas carrying into neighbouring property.
- Any extension to an 01.00 am finish, particularly outdoors, will only make the noise and pollution matters worse.
- The longer hours will also encourage antisocial behaviour, noise, violence, disruption and disturbance.
- Parking problems. The lack of available parking will lead to vehicles parked anti-socially or inconsiderately, left in dangerous positions or causing conflict between public house customers and other residents or business users.
- Litter, particularly from takeaway activities.
- Food odours from takeaway activities.
- The impact of increased licensable activities upon vulnerable nearby residents. These include children and the occupants of nearby sheltered housing.
- Urination in the street.
- Lack of supervision of children within the premises and reports of customers' children playing outside at the front of the venue near to the busy road.
- Children and teens allowed to frequent the venue.
- Failure to meet the terms of the current licence, with sales of alcohol continuing after the end of permitted hours (described as lock-ins.)
- A lack of appropriate Food Registration at the premises.
- A general consensus that permitted hours should be reduced, not increased.
- Police incidents at the premises.
- Nuisance caused by premises customers banging on doors of nearby residences.

- Irresponsible consumption of alcohol.

5.5 The representations made supporting the application counter the assertions of the pro forma objection and express opinions about the following matters

- The premise is an asset to the community.
- The premise provides a social hub for elder and disabled residents as well as the rest of the community.
- There has been no experience of anti-social behaviour nor violence at the premise and such incidents are rare and well handled.
- The premise has become established as a “must go to” and well attended live music venue.
- Entertainment is well managed, considers the neighbours and encourages quiet departure of customers.
- No parking problems been experienced.
- No problems with smoking have been encountered.
- The residents of the nearby sheltered housing complex are also customers at the premises.
- Covid regulations have forced patrons outside into the beer gardens thereby increasing noise levels. This will no doubt reduce as the Covid regulations come to an end soon.
- The venue is a friendly safe and welcoming environment for customers and their children.
- Concern about the nature of a letter circulated by people making representation against the application, the content of which is not agreed with.
- Police incidents at the premises involving the behaviour of neighbours.

## **6.0 ADDITIONAL INFORMATION**

6.1 Some of the matters raised within the representations require further explanation or clarification.

6.2 Noise complaints for the venue have previously been investigated by Chesterfield Borough Council’s Environmental Health department. This department has submitted a representation against the application. The concerns are supported by an email from Police Sergeant Adams who attended an incident at the premises on 24<sup>th</sup> April 2021 where nuisance activity was alleged. The representation and supporting police Email can be seen at Appendix F1.

- 6.3 It is accepted that Lowgates is a busy road with multiple junctions and competing demands for parking space. An enquiry with Chesterfield Borough Council's Community Safety Department and the Police has identified that there are no ongoing complaints in respect of parking or litter at the Speedwell Inn. Staveley Town Council also had no formal complaints but did reference anecdotal concerns from residents over late exits from the premises, noise in the beer garden and parking issues.
- 6.4 In respect of concerns about the impact of the variation on the sheltered accommodation on Leander and Mallard Court, a representation has been received from a Chesterfield Borough Council neighbourhood manager. This representation is included at Appendix F2 and expresses concerns about the impact of noise, parking, antisocial behaviour and disturbance.
- 6.5 One of the representations mentions a lack of Food Registration for the premises. An enquiry with Chesterfield Borough Council's Health and Safety department identifies that the premises is registered appropriately.
- 6.6 The Police have a number of incidents recorded at the Speedwell Inn location over the last two years.
- 30.03.2020 – assault. This incident occurred in the vicinity but was not linked to the venue.
  - 09.06.2020 – reported breach of Covid regulations at the public house which was not substantiated on police investigation.
  - 12.10.2020 – an unrelated incident at the venue and not connected with the operation of the licensed premises.
  - 03.11.2020 – a report of antisocial behaviour which on investigation was found not to be connected to the premises.
  - 12.12.2020 – 3 reports of Covid regulation breaches with people drinking in the beer garden. The police report indicates this was a birthday party and that those involved were dispersed with suitable advice.
  - 14.04.2021 – 4 incidents in relation to confrontation between premises customers and nearby residents. The police email at Appendix F1 refers to this matter.
  - 02.05.2021 – report of a fight/disturbance outside the premises. The police reported that incident was over

before they arrived, and they found no ongoing fight or disturbance.

6.7 The report of irresponsible alcohol consumption relates to a poster displayed at the premises prior to The Early May Bank Holiday in 2021. (A copy is included at Appendix G)

This related to a competition, one of the elements of which was to consume a set amount of alcohol within a predetermined time.

In effect a drinking contest.

This activity would be contrary to the mandatory conditions referred to in the Licensing Act 2003 and subsequent legislation.

The regulations discourage any irresponsible activity or promotion, particularly where rapid consumption of alcohol is promoted.

The information was brought to the Licensing Department's attention after the event, in one of the representations about this application.

The applicant was contacted to discuss the promotion and stated that the event had not taken place and that he was aware it would not be permissible.

6.8 One of the concerns raised in relation to child safety is from the same incident referred to at paragraph 6.7 above where an alleged disturbance was reported.

At around 11.00 pm (after police arrival and departure) one of the representors reports seeing a number of customers leave the premises. This included a young child, carried from by an adult.

The representor raises a number of questions in respect to this.

- The timing of activity is after the end of permitted alcohol sales at the venue.
- The premises had kept doors and windows closed whilst the police were on site, allegedly to avoid detection.
- This would not appear to be a suitable hour to have young children on site.
- A video was recorded of the activity which took place after police departure and is available for viewing.

6.9 In respect of child safety issue, it should be noted that there is specific reference in the licence to the effect that persons under the age of 14 may only access the bar for specific purposes. Several of the representations supporting the application make reference to taking children into the premises and describe the venue as "child" and "family" friendly which may not be compatible with the conditions of the current licence, depending upon the age of the child concerned.

- 6.10 Representations have made requests for site visits. It is not practicable for the Licensing Committee to make site visits, although Licensing Officers are familiar with the location. To better inform the deliberations of the Licensing Committee, Appendix H includes an aerial photograph to give an indication of the proximity of dwellings to the public house.

## **7. THE LICENSING OBJECTIVES, GUIDANCE AND POLICY**

- 7.1 When carrying out its licensing functions in relation to this matter, the Committee must do so in accordance with the provisions contained in the Licensing Act 2003 and with a view to promoting the licensing objectives.
- Prevention of crime and disorder
  - Public safety
  - Prevention of public nuisance
  - Protection of children from harm.
- 7.2 The Committee must have regard to its Statement of Licensing Policy and the guidance issued by the Secretary of State under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003.

## **8. RECOMMENDATION**

- 8.1 That the Committee
- Consider the details and impact of the variation application and the concerns identified in the representations received
  - and determines whether the application for a variation of Premises Licence made by
    - Townes Brewery Ltd
    - In respect of the Speedwell Innbe granted, granted with modification or refused.

## ANNEX 1

### MANDATORY CONDITIONS

- 1 No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence -
  - (a) at any time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
  - (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- 2 Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

### EMBEDDED RESTRICTIONS

#### A. EMBEDDED RESTRICTIONS UNDER THE LICENSING ACT 1964

##### **1 GENERAL**

The following embedded restrictions apply to the premises to the extent that they applied to the premises under the licence granted pursuant to the Licensing Act 1964

##### **2 PERMITTED HOURS**

Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied except during permitted hours.

In this condition, permitted hours means:

- a. On weekdays, other than Christmas Day, Good Friday or New Year's Eve, 10 a.m. to 11 p.m.
- b. On Sundays, other than Christmas Day or New Year's Eve, 12 noon to 10.30 p.m.

- c. On Good Friday, 12 noon to 10.30 p.m.
- d. On Christmas Day, 12 noon to 3 p.m. and 7 p.m. to 10.30 p.m.
- e. On New Year's Eve, except on a Sunday, 11 a.m. to 11 p.m.
- f. On New Year's Eve on a Sunday, 12 noon to 10.30 p.m.
- g. On New Year's Eve from the end of permitted hours on New Year's Eve to the start of permitted hours on the following day (or, if there are no permitted hours on the following day, midnight on 31<sup>st</sup> December).

The above restrictions do not prohibit:

- (a) during the first twenty minutes after the above hours the consumption of alcohol on the premises;
- (b) during the first twenty minutes after the above hours, the taking of the alcohol from the premises unless the alcohol is supplied or taken in an open vessel;
- (c) consumption of the alcohol on the premises or the taking of sale or supply of alcohol to any person residing in the licensed premises;
- (d) during the first thirty minutes after the above hours the consumption of the alcohol on the premises by persons taking meals there if the alcohol was supplied for consumption as ancillary to the meals;
- (e) the ordering of alcohol to be consumed off the premises, or the despatch by the vendor of the alcohol so ordered;
- (f) the sale of alcohol to a trader or club for the purposes of the trade or club;
- (g) the sale or supply of alcohol to any canteen or mess, being a canteen in which the sale or supply of alcohol is carried out under the authority of the Secretary of State or an authorised mess of members of Her Majesty's naval, military or air forces;
- (h) the taking of alcohol from the premises by a person residing there; or
- (i) the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to any private friends of a person residing there who are bona fide entertained by him at his own expense, or the consumption of alcohol by persons so supplied; or
- (j) the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to persons employed there for the purposes of the business carried on by the holder of the licence, or the consumption of liquor so supplied, if the liquor is supplied at the expense of their employer or of the person carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises.

### 3 CHILDREN IN BARS - NO CHILDREN'S CERTIFICATE

No person under fourteen shall be in the bar of the licensed premises during the permitted hours unless one of the following applies:

- (1) He is the child of the holder of the premises licence.

- (2) He resides in the premises, but is not employed there.
- (3) He is in the bar solely for the purpose of passing to or from some part of the premises which is not a bar and to or from which there is no other convenient means of access or egress.
- (4) The bar is in railway refreshment rooms or other premises constructed, fitted and intended to be used bona fide for any purpose to which the holding of the licence is ancillary.

In this condition "bar" includes any place exclusively or mainly used for the consumption of intoxicating liquor. But an area is not a bar when it is usual for it to be, and it is, set apart for the service of table meals and alcohol is only sold or supplied to persons as an ancillary to their table meals.

### **B. EMBEDDED RESTRICTIONS UNDER THE CHILDREN AND YOUNG PERSONS ACT 1933**

The Premises Licence is subject to the restrictions contained in the Children and Young Persons Act 1933 to the extent that any of those restrictions were imposed on the use of the premises for the existing licensable activities under the relevant existing licence or licences.

Describe any additional steps you intend to take to promote the four licensing objectives as a result of the proposed variation:

### **a) General – all four licensing objectives (b, c, d and e) (please read guidance note 11)**

Staff and management recognise the enhanced role that a Public House now has to play in its local community. Behaviour and attitudes that engender inclusion and community spirit are promoted and encouraged. Improper or unsociable behaviour is not tolerated by staff, management or regulars and an equitable and welcoming atmosphere is maintained. By providing a venue that most people would feel safe and comfortable in, we hope to encourage people to have the confidence to socialise and further stimulate the local economy. Regulars already feel that they are a welcome part of the Speedwell community; we would like to think that occasional visitors felt the same way. This sense of inclusion and community spirit brings with it an element of self-policing that, under the watchful eye of staff and management, has allowed the premises to operate without incident for several years.

### **b) The prevention of crime and disorder**

An open, inclusive and positive atmosphere is maintained by staff and management, allowing problems, difficulties or disputes to be readily discussed in an attempt to bring about a speedy resolution. The exterior of the premises is covered by CCTV and notices to this effect are prominently displayed; video records are maintained for seven days and are available to an authorised officer. Illegal drugs are not tolerated on the premises; individuals suspected of being under the influence of or attempting to take illegal drugs will be appropriately challenged and if necessary asked to leave the premises. SIA door staff will be used as and when indicated by risk assessment. Customers whose judgement is or appears to be sufficiently impaired to cause concern to staff and or other customers will not be served further alcoholic beverages and will be encouraged to go home.

### **c) Public safety**

24 hour CCTV video record of the exterior of the premises is maintained for seven days. A portable access ramp is available for disabled customers who can not manage the steps into the building. Staff regularly check the public areas for damage or breakages. Fire safety measures are constantly under review.

### **d) The prevention of public nuisance**

Double glazed windows have been installed to the bar area where live music events take place to minimise noise breakout. Automatic closers have been fitted to the main front door and side door to the beer garden also to minimise noise breakout. A second beer garden has been developed to reduce noise concentration to immediate neighbours. Staff regularly monitor and inspect the beer gardens as part of glass collection duties. Customers are encouraged to leave the premises quietly and to consider our neighbours on their way home; signs to this effect are displayed on the premises. Smoking on the premises is restricted to the beer gardens and is not allowed within or in front of the building.

**e) The protection of children from harm**

A Challenge 25 Scheme is operated at the premises. Acceptable forms of identification are PASS accredited proof of age card, photo driving licence or passport. Failure to produce satisfactory proof of age will result in a refused sale. Clear prominent signage informing customers of the scheme are displayed on the premises. Anyone who appears to be younger than 25 is appropriately challenged; if they can not provide suitable photographic ID proof of age they are not served alcohol.

Children are permitted on the premises in the care and control of their parents or other responsible adult. Known children and teenagers of local families are occasionally allowed onto the premises to await their parents but are not allowed to sit at or loiter around the bar. Children are expected to be off the premises by 2100hrs unless there is a particular event provided for them. Children on the premises are always considered to be under the control and supervision of their parents. Regulars know many of the children and their families, and three generations of several families regularly visit the pub together.

All training is provided on commencement of employment on the law relating to all age restricted products sold and any system or procedures in place which employees are expected to follow. Refresher training is provided at regular intervals (at least six monthly).Records detailing the training provided will be kept for a minimum of two years and made available on request to an Officer of a Responsible Authority.

A refusal log will be maintained which the Designated Premises Supervisor will, at least weekly, examine the record and action as necessary. The records will be retained for a minimum of two years and made available to an Officer of a Responsible Authority on request.








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SPEEDWELL INN

## **ANNEX 1 – MANDATORY CONDITIONS.**

### **Retailing of Alcohol**

1. No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence -
  - (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
  - (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
2. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

### **The Licensing Act 2003 (Mandatory Conditions) Order 2014** **Conditions in force from 28<sup>th</sup> May 2014**

- (1).A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- (2).In this condition:–
  - a. “permitted price” is the price found by applying the formula  $P = D + (D \times V)$ , where–
    - i. P is the permitted price,
    - ii. D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
    - iii. V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
  - b. “duty” is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
  - c. “relevant person” means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence—
    - i. the holder of the premises licence,
    - ii. the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
    - iii. the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
  - d. “relevant person” means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
  - e. “value added tax” means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.

- (3).Where the permitted price would not be a whole number of pennies, the permitted price shall be taken to be the price rounded up to the nearest penny.
- (4).Where the permitted price on a day (“the first day”) would be different from the permitted price on the next day (“the second day”) as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax, the permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

**Mandatory Licensing Conditions**

1. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
- (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
- (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to—
    - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
    - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
  - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
  - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
  - (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;

- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).
2. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
  3. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.  
  
(2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.  
  
(3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
    - (a) a holographic mark, or
    - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
  4. The responsible person must ensure that—
    - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
      - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
      - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
      - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
    - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
    - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.”

#### **If the Premises Licence allows Exhibition of Films**

1. Where a premises licence authorises the exhibition of films, the licence must include a condition requiring the admission of children to the exhibition of any film to be restricted in accordance with recommendations given by;

- a) a 'film classification body' designated under Section 4 of the Video Recordings Act 1984 specified in the licence (currently only the British Board of Film Classification – BBFC) or by the licensing authority itself.

**If the Premises Licence has conditions in respect of Door Supervision.**

(except theatres, cinemas, bingo halls and casinos)

1. Where a premises licence includes a condition that at specified times one or more individuals must be at the premises to carry out a security activity, each such individual must:
  - a) be authorised to carry out that activity by a licence granted under the Private Security Industry Act 2001; or
  - b) be entitled to carry out that activity by virtue of Section 4 of the Act.
2. But nothing in subsection (1) require such a condition to be imposed:
  - a) in respect of premises within paragraph 8(3)(a) of Schedule 2 to the Private Security Industry Act 2001 (c12) (premises with premises licences authorising plays or films); or
  - b) in respect of premises in relation to:
    - (i) any occasion mentioned in paragraph 8(3)(b) or (c) of that Schedule (premises being used exclusively by a club with a club premises certificate, under a temporary event notice authorising plays or films or under a gaming licence), or
    - (ii) any occasion within paragraph 8(3)(d) of that schedule (occasions prescribed by regulations under that Act.
3. For purposes of this section;
  - a) "security activity " means an activity to which paragraph 2(1) (a) of that Schedule applies, and which is licensable conduct for the purposes of that Act, ( see Section 3(2) of that Act) and
  - b) paragraph 8(5) of that Schedule (interpretation of references to an occasion) applies as it applies in relation to paragraph 8 of that schedule.

## **ANNEX 2 - CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH THE OPERATING SCHEDULE**

### **General**

Staff and management recognise the enhanced role that a Public House now has to play in its local community. Behaviour and attitudes that engender inclusion and community spirit are promoted and encouraged. Improper or unsociable behaviour is not tolerated by staff, management or regulars and an equitable and welcoming atmosphere is maintained.

By providing a venue that most people would feel safe and comfortable in, we hope to encourage people to have the confidence to socialise and further stimulate the local economy.

Regulars already feel that they are a welcome part of the Speedwell community; we would like to think that occasional visitors felt the same way. This sense of inclusion and community spirit brings with it an element of self-policing that, under the watchful eye of staff and management, has allowed the premises to operate without incident for several years.

### **The prevention of crime and disorder**

An open, inclusive and positive atmosphere is maintained by staff and management, allowing problems, difficulties or disputes to be readily discussed in an attempt to bring about a speedy resolution.

The exterior of the premises is covered by CCTV and notices to this effect are prominently displayed; video records are maintained for seven days and are available to an authorised officer.

Illegal drugs are not tolerated on the premises; individuals suspected of being under the influence of or attempting to take illegal drugs will be appropriately challenged and if necessary asked to leave the premises.

SIA door staff will be used as and when indicated by risk assessment.

Customers whose judgement is or appears to be sufficiently impaired to cause concern to staff and or other customers will not be served further alcoholic beverages and will be encouraged to go home.

### **Public safety**

24 hour CCTV video record of the exterior of the premises is maintained for seven days.

A portable access ramp is available for disabled customers who can not manage the steps into the building.

Staff regularly check the public areas for damage or breakages.

Fire safety measures are constantly under review.

### **The prevention of public nuisance**

Double glazed windows have been installed to the bar area where live music events take place to minimise noise breakout.

Automatic closers have been fitted to the main front door and side door to the beer garden also to minimise noise breakout.

A second beer garden has been developed to reduce noise concentration to immediate neighbours.

Staff regularly monitor and inspect the beer gardens as part of glass collection duties.

Customers are encouraged to leave the premises quietly and to consider our neighbours on their way home; signs to this effect are displayed on the premises.

Smoking on the premises is restricted to the beer gardens and is not allowed within or in front of the building.

Recorded music - To allow cleaning and ancillary staff to play music on the premises while carrying out their duties outside normal opening times. Usual background music during normal opening hours.

### **The protection of children from harm**

A Challenge 25 Scheme is operated at the premises. Acceptable forms of identification are PASS accredited proof of age card, photo driving licence

or passport. Failure to produce satisfactory proof of age will result in a refused sale. Clear prominent signage informing customers of the scheme are displayed on the premises.

Anyone who appears to be younger than 25 is appropriately challenged; if they cannot provide suitable photographic ID proof of age they are not served alcohol.

Children are permitted on the premises in the care and control of their parents or other responsible adult. Known children and teenagers of local families are occasionally allowed onto the premises to await their parents but are not allowed to sit at or loiter around the bar.

Children are expected to be off the premises by 2100hrs unless there is a particular event provided for them.

Children on the premises are always considered to be under the control and supervision of their parents. Regulars know many of the children and their families, and three generations of several families regularly visit the pub together.

All training is provided on commencement of employment on the law relating to all age restricted products sold and any system or procedures in place which employees are expected to follow. Refresher training is provided at regular intervals (at least six monthly).

Records detailing the training provided will be kept for a minimum of two years and made available on request to an Officer of a Responsible Authority.

A refusal log will be maintained which the Designated Premises Supervisor will, at least weekly, examine the record and action as necessary. The records will be retained for a minimum of two years and made available to an Officer of a Responsible Authority on request.

The premises incorporates TV screens in the public bar that can show films as well as Sky Sports, BT Sport and terrestrial television programmes. Children on the premises are in the care, control and supervision of their parents who will assess the suitability of a film, if any, that happens to be being displayed on the bar televisions for their child. TV-free areas are available if required by the parent.

There is also a separate function room that can show films, via a projector, that would be enhanced by a larger screen and more immersive acoustics. A parent can assess the appropriateness of the film for the child in their care, before entering the function room, from the title and descriptive adverts posted on the premises that also incorporate age-suitability guidance.

As I mentioned earlier. We have had a call from the occupant of [REDACTED], Staveley – she is at her wits end with the pub. Incidents 1031 and 1044 of 24/4 refer.

Since the easing of lockdown and the opening of beer gardens, the Speedwell Inn, which I am told has never had a beer garden, has managed to squeeze one in between the buildings. The landlord has put some speakers in the top floor windows and been blasting music out. I visited the lady at [REDACTED] at to be fair it was horrendous, although the pub had turned off the music the drunken locals were overlooking her and her family, shouting abuse and making drunken comments . Literally her garden fence is the boundary for the pubs “beer garden”.

I understand that the majority of residents on Wharf Lane are upset by this and tensions are running high although I have only spoken with the lady at [REDACTED] who rang police

Prior to me arriving we had also had a call from the pub saying that the occupant of [REDACTED] had been throwing water bombs at his customers! Two drunken customers had gone around to the address, banging on the door making threats. She did say that her 14 yr old son had been throwing water bombs in her garden but not over at the customers.

Anyway the situation for the residents is very frustrating and likely to boil over at some point.

Can the pub just use any outside space as a beer garden? There has been no consideration for neighbours. The noise pollution from the speakers/drunken customers needs to be curtailed if possible? I understand he has applied to extend his licence until 1am? This is going to cause some issues unless he addresses these problems. Can we force the premises to close the outside area/beer garden as it is clearly not suitable?


The Speedwell Inn appears to have little or no designated parking. Parking for the proposed events would therefore use the surrounding residential streets and parking areas where there is already parking pressure at night. The nearest designated parking areas are for use by tenants and visitors to Mallard and Leander Courts (within 10 metres). Parking near the buildings is essential because of the limited mobility of many residents. Their parking space is likely to disproportionately be used as a result of the events. Other areas likely to be affected include parking areas for residents of Pullman Close (within 100 metres).

Because of the nature and time of the events, there would be an unacceptable increase in disturbance even from activity that would not normally be considered to be anti-social (e.g., noise associated with socialising, taxi drop-off and pick up), but would still have a disproportionate impact arising from the times and frequency proposed.

The Speedwell Inn is in an area of mixed sheltered and general needs housing within 100 metres. This venue is already causing problems for the residents who live nearby, in terms of noise late at night and noise from people making their way to and from the venue, if the licence is extended as proposed this will further add to the distress of local residents

There is already a letter problem in the area and the provision of yard on and off the premises and the late opening hours would only aggravate the situation

Mallard Court, currently being refurbished is sited to the rear of the premises, a large complex for elderly people.

Hard amplified music from inside the premises can already be heard and is disturbing local residents. Allowing this to go on outdoors would increase the noise nuisance over a considerable distance.

Indeed I would recommend that a site visit for the committee to ascertain the close proximity of the venue to the local residents, be arranged.

I would suggest that rather than extend the licensing hours it would be better to curtail the license to 10.30pm rather than 11pm, let alone 1am.

Also what sort of extraction arrangements will be stipulated to prevent unpleasant cooking odors permeating into the residents garden/home situated close

to the venue? They already suffer from the smell of tobacco smoke.

What will be the requirements for security staff to ensure public order at the premises?

What will be the arrangements in the licence for the accommodation and supervision safety of children at the premises, having in mind that the premises are situated near a large local school?

Young children may suffer sleep deprivation from the noise after people are leaving the venue beyond term

1. It is unfair that a venue situated so close to local residents' homes should be allowed to be making noise and playing loud music this late into the night.
2. There have already been many reports of alcohol fuelled anti-social behaviour i.e fighting, which is disturbing the peace and safety of local residents, let alone with extended hours.
3. The venue is located backing onto Mallard Court, which is a large complex housing many elderly people who do not need to be caused disturbance and upset due to any noise and commotion.
4. Loud music from inside the premises can already be heard at nearby properties - if this was to be extended outdoors, even more households would be affected by the noise.

5. This venue is already causing a lot of distress to residents living nearby as they are unable to peacefully relax in their own gardens any night of the week the venue is open which will be made worse by extended opening hours.
  
  6. Serving food and alcohol on and off the premises will lead to excess litter, food odours, more cars and more noise at the venue. Insufficient street cleaners are provided by the council already, and it is left to residents to pick up the mess which they should not have to do.
  
  7. The council are already aware of parking issues at this part of Lowgates; the venue has no parking and has double yellow lines outside the premises. Already there have been many occurrences and issues of patrons parking on the pavements and nearby streets which are already full to capacity.

The licensing committee should consider not accepting the proposal to extend opening hours, and the ability to serve food and drink on and off premises for the above reasons.

Residents request that a site visit be made by the licensing committee to ascertain the close proximity of this venue to a quiet residential area.

I wish to place on record my **objection** to this application.

The Notice of Application states that the applicant wishes to extend their entertainment facility to 2330 Monday to Thursday and until 0100 Friday to Saturday. This raises a significant concern as a resident and neighbour of the applicant in relation to noise pollution and anti-social behaviour. Under the current licence, the applicant has permission to play live music. However, this music has been so loud at times that in my double glazed house across the street I have been able to hear the singer word for word. I, along with other residents and neighbours, have raised complaints with Chesterfield Borough Council. Esther Thelwell has been our contact with the council and she should have records of previous noise-related complaints. Council Officers did visit the outside of the Speedwell Inn during a Saturday night when a band was playing and noted for themselves the excess noise pollution. The applicant has also failed to adhere to their current licence by allowing bands to play loud music past midnight on almost every occasion that a band is booked.

The Notice of Application states that the applicant wishes to serve refreshments on and off-premises between 2300-2330 Monday to Thursday and 2300 – 0100 Friday to Saturday. This raises concerns regarding additional littering in the vicinity of the Speedwell Inn. Currently, visitors to the Speedwell Inn smoke on the front of the premises on the public footpath. Some, not all, then drop their cigarette ends onto the footpath. This litter is not frequently collected by the applicant meaning that the footpath can remain unsightly. The addition of on or off licence refreshments could result in significant littering in the vicinity of the Speedwell Inn, thus attracting rats or other pests to the area.

The Notice of Application states that the applicant wishes to extend the sale of alcohol on and off-premises to 2330 Monday to Thursday and 0100 Friday to Saturday. This raises serious concerns as a resident and neighbour of the applicant. The applicant fails to adhere to their current licence in relation to the sale of alcohol as such as they regularly hold 'lock-ins' after their advertised closing time. As a neighbour of the applicant, I can monitor closely how often this occurs. It appears that on Thursday and

Saturday nights especially, patrons of the applicant can still be seen leaving the Speedwell Inn after a 'lock-in', the latest I have witnessed is 0300. Those leaving after the official closing time do so loudly and in an anti-social manner, shouting and disturbing the peace. There are also frequent taxi bookings made for pick up from the Speedwell Inn in the early hours of the morning. These taxi's on occasion will sound their horns, contrary to Rule 112 of the Highway Code, in the early hours of the morning and will sit with the car engine idling.

On Sunday 2<sup>nd</sup> May 2021 the applicant advertised and hosted a 'challenge' competition at the Speedwell Inn, a copy of the poster is attached to my email. This challenge was to begin at 1700 and entailed a timed beer drinking challenge, timed eating challenge and a throwing challenge. To my knowledge, the Speedwell Inn does not hold a food hygiene certificate, and I would be interested to know if the applicant registered the Speedwell Inn with Chesterfield Borough Council 28 days before distributing cooked food as required by law.

I was caused to call 999 for Police assistance on the same evening at 22:42 following a series of anti-social, alcohol-fuelled, disturbances emanating from the Speedwell Inn. Police reference 1313/2<sup>nd</sup> May 2021 refers. A group of clearly intoxicated men emerged from the Speedwell Inn shouting, acting aggressively and one male was shouting threats to kill everyone inside the Speedwell Inn. A fight then ensued at the roadside outside the Speedwell Inn. Not only was this disturbance late at night and a severe breach of the peace, but it caused distress to elderly residents close by and made them feel unsafe in their own homes. Police attended briefly but upon their arrival, those involved had left the scene. At this time the front doors to the Speedwell Inn were closed and curtains closed giving an appearance that the applicant had closed. However, I took a video showing a large group of people leaving shortly after the Police had attended at approximately 23:00. One male left the Speedwell Inn carrying two full pints, another male was seen to urinate in public on the street adjacent to the Speedwell Inn where residents park their cars. The video also shows a woman carrying a child out of the Speedwell Inn in her arms. This video has been attached to my email to the Licencing Team and can be viewed until 10<sup>th</sup> June 2021 unless downloaded.

This Notice of Application has been made at a time when vulnerable and elderly residents living at the sheltered housing block on Pullman Close are potentially unaware of it, and as such have not been allowed to voice their support or objection. The activities and behaviour of the applicant affect all residents in the local community and as such, they must be given a voice whilst their accommodation is being renovated.

Following the Government's National Lockdown in response to COVID-19, the Speedwell Inn has appeared to remain closed. I have made a Freedom of Information request to Derbyshire Constabulary regarding any breaches of Lockdown Restrictions relating to the illegal sale of alcohol on the premises. I am currently awaiting a response to this request.

Since re-opening, the Speedwell Inn has utilised an area to the rear of their premises for an outdoor beer garden. It is my understanding that any licence for the sale of alcohol is for the actual pub building itself and does not extend to a beer garden. Photographs taken from the applicants own social media platforms are attached. There is no Notice of Application detailing the addition of this facility. Also, it has been noted that since re-opening the applicant has closed the main entrance door and the curtains as soon as daylight is lost. I and other neighbours can still hear intermittent talking from the Speedwell Inn and patrons are seen leaving from the main entrance some time after the doors are closed. This is highly suggestive that the applicant is allowing their patrons to mingle inside the Speedwell Inn contrary to current restrictions.

The applicant allows children and minors to enter the premises and remain in there until closing time, whenever that happens to be. I have witnessed intoxicated adults leaving the premises with young children in their care. The adults are barely able to stand themselves let alone care for a child. Children are often allowed to play unattended outside the premises on the public footpath. This has happened on many occasions during the summer and winter months. As the Speedwell Inn is located on the very busy A619 the danger to these children is tangible. The applicant also permits teenagers to enter the premises unaccompanied by an adult, with some being dropped off by private cars and others in a taxi.

During these challenging times, I am very much in favour of local and independent businesses working to make their living. However, the applicant has total disregard for any aspect of their current licence and will not adhere to any variations as proposed. The applicant is smug and tries to use intimidation when neighbours express their concerns; the applicant feels that the rules everyone must follow do not apply to them. Should Chesterfield Borough Council approve this variation it will only endorse the applicant's sense of immunity.

A copy of this letter has been sent to Lee Rowley, Member of Parliament for North East Derbyshire. I am happy to discuss any points raised in greater detail.

I wish to object to the application you have received for the above mentioned premises in relation to the indoor and outdoor music and the extended alcohol hours.

The premises have very limited outdoor space and is in the middle of a residential area.

The outdoor space runs parallel and adjacent to residential properties. The house wall of the adjacent property forms the boundary for one the outside areas and garden walls from properties on Wharf Lane form the boundary for the rear outside space.

To the rear of the property is the Chesterfield Borough Council sheltered housing scheme Mallard Court (currently being refurbished to high standard).

The premises have no parking space and off -street parking in the local area is at a premium for residents with most properties having no off road parking available to them.

The increased noise from entertainment at the establishment will cause stress and anxiety to local residents and this could lead to increased noise and anti social behaviour complaints being logged with the Council.

The extended hours could also lead to an increase in antisocial behaviour and noise as customers leave the premises to return to their vehicle or to walk home.

If possible it may be prudent to do noise monitoring when groups are playing and crowds gathering. The late May bank holiday may be a good time for this.

We have now been subjected to music, loud voices and smell of cigarettes in my garden. If this was to continue till 1am in the morning then it would be completely unacceptable, invasive,distressing, disruption of sleep and will not be something that we as residents for the past 20 year have experienced and dont think we should have to endeavour now . We understand that this is the only way with the current government regulation that the pub can open. Extending the licensing hours in a residential area is only going to cause disruption, distress , antisocial behaviour, noise,disturbance .We strongly object to all these changes .

We as a family wish to place on record our objection to the above application for the following reasons:

1. Wishing to extend their hours for live entertainment and playing music both inside and outside raises significant concerns due to noise pollution. We already have to endure this for their current licence and music can be heard in our house going late into the night past their current licencing time. Any extension will cause even more disruption to sleep and being able to relax in our own home.
2. During the summer months we are unable to sit outside in our garden because of the noise pollution from music being played from INSIDE the venue and we have to have our doors and windows closed to try and block out the noise from the live entertainment the venue has on. If they are then able to have this playing outside as well, this is going to be even more unbearable and we will be prisoners in our own home not being able to enjoy the simple pleasure of sitting in our garden on a summer evening, or even being able to have our doors or windows open.
3. The applicant does not adhere to its current licencing rules as on numerous occasions patrons have been heard leaving the premises in the early hours of the morning, sometimes at 3am when taxi's can be heard outside with their engines running and doors slamming as patrons get in them. If the hours are to be extended this will be even worse and cause more disruption to our sleep. Other residents and I have previously put in complaints about this to the council.
4. We already have to cope with unsociable behaviour from patrons coming out of the premises at various times of the night and coming from the 'beer garden' which we can hear from our garden. We shouldn't have to put up with hearing foul language and shouting when we are trying to relax in our homes. Again, this will only get worse if the current licence is extended.
5. On several occasions we have had incidents where patrons bang on our windows and front door as they go past after coming out of the pub. On Saturday 24<sup>th</sup> April 2021 members of staff were sent to bang on our windows and our neighbours windows, and

even confronted some of our neighbours. We should not have to feel intimidated in our own homes and wonder when the next incident is going to take place. On this occasion the police were called.

6. An extension in opening hours and alcohol serving times will increase the antisocial behaviour we already have to endure. For example, on Sunday 2<sup>nd</sup> May 2021 the venue advertised a series of drinking games and cheap beer. On the same evening a group of youths could be heard shouting and fighting outside the pub and in front of mine and my neighbour's house with one threatening to knife somebody. Again, the police were called on this occasion.
7. There are no parking facilities for the pub and this is something we have to battle with as residents. This has caused issues for my family and residents who are unable to park at their own homes. Patrons park with no regard for local residents and will park on the pavements up and down Wharf Lane, Fan Road, Mallard Court and the side road next to the pub. My family has had numerous damages caused to their cars due to patron's inconsideration.
8. The pub is situation in the middle of a residential area, backing onto Mallard court which is a residential complex for elderly people. This is currently being refurbished so the residents are unaware of the above application. The licences the venue wish to apply for is inappropriate for its location and should not be approved.
9. As with lack of parking, there is also lack of a children's play area. Children of the patrons therefore play outside of the pub next to the busy A619 or on the side roads where residents park their cars. On Sunday 2<sup>nd</sup> May 2021 there was another incident where a car hit our house, this was late at night but could happen any time when potentially a child could be seriously injured while playing in front of the pub. There are numerous occasions where cars mount the pavement to undertake cars turning right onto Fan Road which again only needs a child to run into its path.

The venue is already causing much stress and anxiety to local residents who work hard and have the right to be able to come home from work and relax in their own homes. This is currently not possible and will become even worse if their new licencing request is approved. As Article 8 of the Human Rights Act 1998 states 'everyone has the right to respect for your private life, your family life, your home and your correspondence – It is a right to enjoy your existing home peacefully'.

1. It is outrageous that hard working local residents – who pay their Council Tax – should be subjected to even more noise into the night than is already caused by this venue.
2. The Council will already be aware of parking issues at this part of Lowgates; the venue has no parking and has 'double yellow lines' along the main road outside the premises. There are already issues of patrons parking on the pavement. Wharf Lane nearby is at full capacity at night as is Bellhouse Lane.
3. There have already been reports of incidents of alcohol-fuelled anti-social behaviour and even fighting.
4. There are already litter problems in this immediate area and the likelihood this venue will create even more. Insufficient street cleaners are provided by the Council for Lowgates, therefore residents are expected to clean up the mess. Proprietors of the venue will NOT be required to clean up the extra mess.
5. The Speedwell Inn want to sell food both on and off the premises - i.e. takeaway – which will cause more rubbish, more odours, more cars and more noise. To deal with odours extractor fans need to be of correct capacity with suitable filters to prevent unpleasant smells outside the premises.  
There are already 6 takeaways between Lowgates and Staveley – and upwards of 14

within a 2½ mile radius; all reports on ill health cite fast food as causative factors of the worst diseases – cancer, diabetes, heart disease, obesity etc.

On the topic of unpleasant smells, a number of residents closest to the venue are experiencing the smell of tobacco smoke – often continuously for hours – which is already established as the main cause of lung cancer.

6. The Speedwell Inn is located backing onto Mallard Court (currently being refurbished) - a large complex for elderly people.
7. What will be the arrangements in the license for the accommodation/supervision/safety of children at the premises.
8. The local residents request that a site visit is made to ascertain the close proximity of this venue to a quiet residential area.
9. Loud amplified music from INSIDE the premises can be heard already from nearby properties – if this was to be extended to outdoors very many more householders would be affected, outdoor amplified music can travel a considerable distance particularly at night; it would make sleep impossible and life unbearable for those nearby.
10. This venue is already causing much distress to those living nearby. Instead of being able to peacefully relax in their gardens, after a hard days work, they experience noise and cigarette smoke.  
The Licensing Committee should consider – instead of extending – curtailing the licence to 10.30 p.m. instead of 11.00 p.m.  
There will not be a single day or night free from outdoor music, alcohol, noise and cigarette smoke. This will affect much of the locality.

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

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

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

Dear Sir/Madam,

I am writing to you to provide a brief outline as to why the variation to the establishments license should be approved.

I have been a patron of the Speedwell Inn for the last five years and during that time I have seen the pub become established as a thriving, vibrant asset to the local community. Not only does it provide a welcome relief from the faceless brewery chain owned pubs, but it also provides an important part in maintaining the sense of community in Stavely. The vast majority of its clientele are indeed local living within 10 minutes' walk of the pub, many of these people are elderly and benefit from being able to catch up with their friends over a pint or two. It is one of those traditional pubs where everyone is on first name terms and looks out for one another, indeed over the time I have frequented the pub I can't ever recall seeing any antisocial behaviour of any sort (the locals are of the more mature age and not want to cause any sort of unpleasantness).

Since taking over the tenure of The Speedwell the Landlord and Land Lady have worked tirelessly to improve the whole fabric of the pub, including a creation of two outside seating areas, replacement windows, constant decorating, provision of handrails etc to make access easier for elderly/disabled customers. They have also established the Speedwell as a must go to venue for live music- the bands are universally well attended both by locals and folks travelling from further afield. These music evenings are well managed with all consideration being paid to neighbours regards managing the possible inconvenience caused by live music- people are encouraged to leave quietly and in an orderly and respectful manner to avoid causing any potential problems.

So to sum up in my opinion (and that of many others) it would be no detriment to grant the proposed variation to the existing license, this would no doubt result in The Speedwell continuing to grow in stature as an important part of the local community and play a vital role in the regeneration of Stavely.

## Appendix F28

I would like to register my support for the above application for the licensing hours change.

I am aware that there is a form letter being distributed around the local area by a very small number of residents encouraging people to oppose the extended hours application. I would like to take the opportunity to refute these points from the position of a local resident and regular patron of the Speedwell Inn.

As I do not have digital copy of the opposition letter the points will be paraphrased here

### **1. Noise Issues**

1a. All of the patrons of the Speedwell Inn are also hard working local residents, who also pay council tax. The venue has no large in house PA system and other than the occasional special event, does not put on live music. The noise generated by this venue is minimal at best and I would estimate this falls well under the legal 85db levels for background music and ambient conversation.

### **2. Parking Issues**

2a. The issue of parking is a moot point, the Speedwell Inn does not generate inbound traffic from outside the local area on a day to day basis and the vast majority of regular patrons are local residents. There is also ample parking space round the back of the venue adjacent to Mallard Court should a special event generate additional traffic

### **3. Fighting and anti-social behaviour**

3a. The owners of the venue take a very strong zero tolerance stance on these behaviours and while every pub, from time to time, will experience some element of this, incidents in the Speedwell Inn are extremely rare and are handled quickly and professionally.

### **4. Litter Problems**

4a. Simply put the Speedwell Inn does not generate any litter, there is nothing for the patrons to litter with as this venue does not provide takeout or any other litter generating services. I am also a member of the Staveley and Local Area voluntary litter picking teams and well aware of what businesses around the area generate problems. The Speedwell Inn is not one of them.

### **5. Food Sales**

5a. The Speedwell Inn has never, and has no plans to, ever sell a food service or provide a takeout food service, therefore this point can be discounted.

### **6. Mallard Court Location**

6a. Unsurprisingly, given the location of the venue and its role as a community social pub, many of the residents of the Mallard Court housing complex are regular visitors to

the Speedwell Inn and in the many years I have been a regular patron I am unaware of any complaints coming from Mallard Court.

### **7. Children on the premises**

7a. As you are probably aware the Licencing Act 2003 removed the majority of restrictions on families with children visiting pubs and as happens in every pub up and down the country, the supervision and safety of any children in the pub falls on the families themselves and not on the venue (with health,safety and public liability taken in to account).

### **8. Site visit request**

8a. As mentioned above this is a very small number of residents and not something the wider residential community is requesting. I would also point out that the Speedwell Inn has been a public house for many many years and its proximity to the local residential areas has been a net benefit to the community as a social gathering space.

### **9. Outdoor amplified music**

9a. The venue has no external PA system and the increase in outdoor drinking is simply due to the coronavirus restrictions currently in place. Once the restrictions have lifted (Monday 17th May) external noise will drop significantly.

### **10. Distress to local residents**

10a. While I cannot speak to the feelings of the authors of the opposition letter I do know that many local residents, including myself, benefit greatly from having a safe local establishment to socialise in and relax in after a hard day's work. Historically the venue has hosted many special occasions for local residents including birthdays, engagements and anniversaries, these are a net benefit to the community and local residents.

### **11. Human rights act (Article 8)**

11a. While article 8 does indeed state that:

"Everyone has the right to respect for his private and family life, his home and his correspondence."

I find it interesting that the opposition letter does not include the full article, which also states:

"There shall be no interference by a public authority with the exercise of this right **except such as is in accordance with the law** and is necessary in a democratic society in the interests of national security, public safety or the economic well-being of the country, for the prevention of disorder or crime, for the protection of health or morals, **or for the protection of the rights and freedoms of others.**"

To my knowledge the Speedwell Inn has always acted within the local licencing laws and regulations and therefore has not contravened the Human Rights Act (1998).

In summary the Speedwell Inn has been a cornerstone of the local community for many years and this application, to allow the venue to compete with other local

establishments, should be granted in full. The complaints laid out in the opposition letter are fully without merit, poorly presented and borderline misleading.

As local residents and supporters of our community spaces, we the undersigned, fully support the above application for the Speedwell Inn.

I'm writing as a customer of the above Public House. Not a daily customer but frequently over the last 20 years. Formerly living in Shuttwood then up until last month 8 years at Mastin Moor and currently 75 Bainbridge road Bolsover S44 6UA.

When in a car we park down Fan Road and do not cause any difficulty for residents or other road users. Many of the customers are in fact local and walk(as we did for 8yrs from Mastin Moor) or come by public transport some by taxi reducing further the impact on parking. These all go towards helping the local economy too.

So I and my wife and friends have experienced different landlords. The current owners who have continued the traditional brewing on site of excellent Derbyshire ales have revitalised the pub in every way. Decor outside spaces and encouraged loyal regular customers. They have also introduced occasionally live music supporting the local musicians who have fewer venues to share their talents.

At no time on any of my visits has there been any signs of violence or abuse or littering. In fact when there is music the Landlady restricts use of the outside spaces for those who have to have a smoke but always within the pubs boundaries. She also ensures the doors and windows are kept closed to reduce noise drifting out. Obviously its impossible to nullify sound but it is only occasionally and anyone living near a Public House should expect some noise and as the Pub has been there for many years. It therefore should be a consideration when deciding where to live.

As this is not a Brewery owned Pub but owned and operated by the Landlord & Landlady as their home and key income source it is vital they within the law strive to improve and increase income especially after having been locked down for so long.

I therefore fully support the application and disagree strongly with the points raised in an objection letter I have seen.

I was shown an "objection to the licencing application" today. In my humble opinion the statements given for objection are quite aggressive in their nature.

I am a local resident and I frequent the Speedwell Inn on quiet nights in the week and live performance nights too, over many years under many different landlords.

██████████ lived in the end house next door to the Speedwell in its "heyday" of live music in the 60's and 70's I was a young kid then and even then the music from the speedwell was acceptable in both volume and quality. There isn't many venues around here for live music now. The pub scene in Staveley and Lowgates, Mastin Moor has been decimated over the years. It's dying as it is and doesn't need killing off. Live performance at this venue isn't a problem and never has been, what is a problem is residents moving to the locality near to a venue of public institution and complaining about a valuable community service and spirit that has, quite frankly existed for decades.

Answering the following reasons as stated on the letter....

1 Whenever i've been in the pub and left. It's quiet both inside and outside. There is no trouble.

2 ██████████ live on Wharf Lane and have for the last 30 years, i have too in my youth. There isn't overspill from the pub parking area as far as i am aware.

3 Whenever i have been to the pub i have never witnessed fighting or anti social behaviour inside or outside the premises.

4 I've not noticed litter problems around the premises.

5 I have never heard something so ridiculous as tobacco smoke being a issue outside. The smoking area outside is well ventilated and i would assume everything is in line with government guidance on smoking area requirements.

6 Mallard court has mostly been used as a elderly residence since it's inception decades ago. I remember it being built when i used to visit my grandparents, the house next door but one to the speedwell.

7 There are sufficient things in place for children to be there safely. I take my children there sometimes and i can assure you if it wasn't a child friendly atmosphere then i wouldn't take them.

8 The Speedwell is and always has been situated in a quiet residential area. It's a public house, there are not many left now. These national institutions provide a much needed injection of life into residential areas.

9 At best there is muffled music from the speedwell on live performance nights. I'm pretty sure that the landlord and landlady know their business and all it entails inside out and work within ALL current and will continue to work with future performance times, with a duty of care to customers and residents of the locality.

10 I have not heard one single complaint about the speedwell inn . I visit [REDACTED] regularly on wharf lane and there has been no mention of any noise pollution, rowdiness, litter, anti-social behavior or anything else of that matter. They are elderly in their mid to late 70's and have lived within the vicinity of the speedwell for the last 30 years at least.

11 i have read Article 8 "Respect for your private and family life" and find this of no real relevance to these objections.

This email has been forwarded to the landlady at the Speedwell Inn at her request.

When I moved to Staveley four years ago I went in some of the local public houses eventually ending up at the speedwell inn.

This is now the only pub I go in as it is quiet and both Nicoletta and Laurie the landlord and land lady in my opinion have turned one of the oldest pubs in Staveley into the only friendly family pub in Staveley, they are always happy to see you and always polite and professional.

I have visit the pub mainly on a Sunday afternoons were the pub as a lovely friendly atmosphere and it is mainly the same locals you see every time i would guess the age group of people are mainly late thirties upwards unlike the all inn that caters more for the youngsters. The speedwell has no jukebox or gambling machines so I guess that it doesn't attract them. I have also attended live music events on a Saturday night but these always are at a manageable volume were you can still talk and the music I would guess finishes at no later than 22.00hrs.

I fell if you read this petition properly it is an attack on not just the Speedwell Inn but infant all local business and even the local council as it goes on about litter takeaway foods etc. I think the person who wrote this petition just simply has it in for everyone.

I would like to counter argue each point of the petition that I am sure will have seen.

1. Hard working local residents that pay there council tax should be subjected the noise from this venue. I am sure you have done a site visit, i have no idea how old the Speedwell Inn is although it does show on the old 1881 ordnance survey maps. This building is off old construction solid walls, solid wood and stone its is not a 1980,s poorly built venue it has been built to last thus having sound dampening capabilities purely by construction alone. the pub as a garden to the rear that has only been used during the cover 19 rules and a smoking garden to the right that is gated in. Nicoleta doesn't allow smoking in front of the pub itself.

2 .The petition refers to parking this argument holds no water as no one really parks at the pub because they have a drink. Very Different if a food license was being applied for I agree.

3. i have never ever seen or hared of any incident at the speedwell inn I am sure the local police station can confirm this.

4. I feel the litter issue can't be directed at any pub as they do not do take aways this is more a direct dig at the shop across the road and takeaways close by.

5. The only food served in the pub are nuts and crisps and the odd birthday cake for the locals.

As the petition says there are plenty enough in the 2 miles around the Speedwell Inn. i am sure you agree that claim itself is outrageous.

6. The pub backs onto mallard court yes it does however the public bar that was at that end of the pub is now a micro brewery. The distance from the front bar to mallard court is vast. it is clear that whomever wrote this petition is a none supporter of local business at all whatever the business.

7. i have only ever seen children in the pub being looked after and never in the late evening or close to closing time.

8. The quiet residential area has had the Speedwell Inn in it for 200 years residents have lived with it without double glazing and various other sound proofing building material and furniture unavailable 200 years again I have never heard noisy people leaving and the pub never has capacity like the all inn.

9. As stated there is no duke box so no amplified music apart from band night once every now and then and that always finishes at a sensible time.

10. i believe point 10 is probably a attack from a bitter neighbour I have never smelt cigarette smoke coming in the pub from the smoking area or outside the front gate of the pub. i am also a anti smoker and wouldn't like this, this is a false segment by far. there are certainly no outdoor speakers or as stated no duke box inside the pub. there is sometime music via a phone connected via bluetooth as you know even on full blast they are certainly not amplified.

In conclusion I feel the petition is a direct attack on all the local business takeaways shops pizza place chip shop etc.

The speedwell in my opinion by extending its hours will have little to nothing effect on local residents as it is not a noisy pub anyway it is simply an old fashioned family run pub for hard working and retired locals that was (not drive) to the pub for a quiet pint or two.

This is the last local public house business in staveley and it should be supported in any way it can by locals and local government.

## Appendix F40

I have seen today a letter objecting to various aspects of licensing at the above establishment.

I find the objections therein both surprising, and highly inaccurate.

I would like to address some of the points therein:

To my knowledge The Speedwell has no intention of serving food on a regular basis, for consumption in the pub, and certainly not for takeaway.

Regarding parking, as a regular customer I do not know of any customer parking outside the pub on the pavement at any time. I have seen on several occasions however, people parking on the footpath to run over to the shop opposite for provisions. To my knowledge there has only been one occasion, and that was fairly recently, where there has been any trouble.

An isolated incident in all the years Laurie and Nicoletta have owned the premises. Indeed one lady customer told us tonight she feels very safe in the Speedwell coming in on her own with her dog, not feeling uncomfortable at all.

The food cooking smells mentioned cannot be coming from The Speedwell as they do not serve food, the only smells around that area are from Pizza Uno, and these are not excessive or unpleasant.

Regarding the smoking problem, I do not believe it exists. As a non smoker myself, I do not find the smoking outside a problem, as it is only a few people. I fail to see how this can be a problem to local residents, if it is not a problem in the pub garden itself. Litter from takeaways from the pub can hardly be a problem, when they don't serve takeaways.

With reference to public disorder being a potential problem to Mallard Court, there is no throughway to there from the Speedwell.

It will be up to parents to control their children should they bring them in to the pub, as it would be in any establishment.

The reference to it being a quiet residential area is totally inaccurate, the premises are on an exceptionally busy A road, and at a junction with Fan Road. Meaning that the large amount of heavy lorries have to turn in to Fan Road.

Fan Road is an incline, and heavy lorries have to make several gear changes as they leave the junction outside the pub, providing a colossal amount of traffic noise.

I am assured any outside music would be on a very occasional basis.

In my opinion Laurie and Nicoletta run a very pleasant and well managed establishment, with as previously mentioned, almost no problems.

One final point I would like to make is that if the complainant is so upset by cigarette smoke, noise, music etc, why on earth would you rent a house next door to the pub.

## Appendix F43

Hello Steve, I work for the Speedwell inn I have been made aware of a letter that has been posted to people in Staveley. I feel I have to tell you the actualities as this letter has quite a lot of inaccuracies.

### 1. The letter states -

'It is outrageous that hard working local residents - who pay their council tax - should be subjected to even more noise into the night than is already caused by this venue'

Many of our customers are also hard working local residents, we adhere to last orders/closing times.

### 2. The letter states -

'The council will already be aware of parking issues at this part of lowgates, the venue has no parking and has 'Double yellow lines' along the main road outside the premises. There are already issues of patrons parking on the pavement. Wharf lane nearby is at full capacity as is Bellhouse lane.'

Our customers do not drive to The Speedwell Inn to spend hours drinking, Our customers are typically walking or using taxi's. I am sure you can appreciate we are a small venue and we are rarely busy enough to require two members of staff. Before covid if we had a special occasion or entertainment there could be two staff for 4/5 hours on a Saturday, then we would close at closing time and customers would go home or go to another near by pub licenced till 1am, so I am not sure who is causing the parking issues on those streets but I can tell you they are not at our venue because it's not busy enough and our customers are not so irresponsible.

Currently I'm doing 6 hours a week and before covid I would do around 9, weekend afternoons can be our best shifts. On the weekdays now and before covid there would often only be 1 or 2 people in, we are not a night club, we are a real ale brewery inn. I have worked in many alcohol based venues so I have experience to say that we and our customers are respectful and responsible.

### 3. The letter states -

'There have already been reports of incidents of anti social behaviour and even fighting'

I don't know what these reports are, I have been working there for about 3 years, I have never had to call the landlord for assistance with any customer difficulties. We are a friendly welcoming environment and should not be blamed for any behaviours displayed near by of people who are not our customers as I know youths in the area cause problems like breaking into the over 55s residential refurbishments which was talked about amongst some of our customers who used to live there.

### 4. The letter states -

'There are already litter problems in this immediate area and the likelihood this venue will create even more. Insufficient street cleaners are provided by the council for Lowgates, therefore residents are expected to clean up the mess. Proprietors of the venue will NOT be required to clean up the extra mess.'

If our customers have snacks, bottles, cans etc, WE dispose of all rubbish correctly including recycling sections. WE regularly sanitise tables (even before covid) empty outdoor ashtrays and WE regularly collect all rubbish and glasses. The Speedwell Inn has plant pots outside the front door and I have arrived to work before and noticed that passing people have put rubbish in them, products that we don't even sell and we just dispose of in the correct manner as soon as noticed. We consistently maintain cleanliness to a high standard I guarantee that personally.

5. The letter states -

'The Speedwell Inn want to sell food both on and off the premises - i.e. takeaway - which will cause more rubbish, more odours, more cars, more noise. To deal with odours extractor fans need to be of correct capacity with suitable filters to prevent unpleasant smells outside the premises.

There are already 6 takeaways between Lowgates and Staveley - and upwards of 14 within a 2.5 mile radius; all reports on ill health cite fast food as causative factors of the worst diseases - cancer, diabetes, heart disease obesity etc.

On the topic of unpleasant smells, a number of residents closest to the venue are experiencing the smell of tobacco smoke - often continuously for hours - which is already established as the main form of lung cancer.'

We have no intentions of serving any food there is takeaway alcohol service like speciality brewed ales.

There are two beer gardens, a small side one with 4 separate tables and 12 chairs, it is walled off by the pub building and the wall to a neighboring terraced house, a high fence and gate leading to the main road.

There is a larger beer garden to the rear of the venue surrounded by high walls and there are 2 sheltered areas for smoking, the garden has 4 tables and 18 seats and 2 wall shelves for standing room for an extra 4. We follow all the correct rules and I don't think any extra could be done in regards to smokers as it is high walls surrounding garden and sheltered roofs on the wall that separates from residential dwellings.

6. The Speedwell Inn is located backing on to Mallard Court (Currently being refurbished) - A large complex for elderly people.

A large part of our customer demographic is those elderly people. They were moved when refurbishments began and some may return afterwards, some may stay in their new places close by. We are more than just a place to drink for many of these people, its company and friendship.

7. The letter states -

'What will be the arrangement in the licence for the accommodation/supervision/safety of children at the premises.'

I am not sure what this person is referring to here, as far as I am aware supervision and safety of children is their care givers responsibility. We are family and dog friendly, we don't have many children visit, when they do they are often spending time with grandparents/family (covid has affected the family meet ups obviously) in an afternoon. I have never once been concerned about the welfare of a child that has visited our venue.

8. The letter states -

'The local residents request that a site visit is made to ascertain the close proximity of this venue to a quiet residential area.'

Lets not forget The Speedwell Inn has been a local venue since before people moved in so closely to it.

9. The letter states -

'Loud amplified music from inside the premises can be heard already from nearby properties - if this was to be extended to outdoors very many more householders would be effected, outdoor amplified music can travel a considerable distance particularly at night; it would make sleep impossible and life unbearable for those nearby.'

We play music through a bluetooth speaker at appropriate volumes at appropriate times. The bluetooth speaker is located about 6/8 feet from the front door on a bottom shelf of a three tier bookshelf. The side beer garden is about 16 feet away to the right and the back beer garden is about twice as far, the back garden has a brick garage building with a speaker but that is not used regularly as not often busy enough to be using both beer gardens, there is no amplification as in special equipment nor is music ever so loud that people can't converse it's background music, not offensive in my opinion, we play older music that the customers like they enjoy it and I am sure they would complain if it was too loud, remember the majority of our customers are more mature.

10. The letter states -

'This venue is already causing much distress to those living near by. Instead of being able to peacefully relax in their gardens, after a hard days work, they experience noise and cigarette smoke.

The licensing committee should consider - instead of extending - curtailing the license to 10.30pm instead of 11pm. There will not be a single day or night free from outdoor music, alcohol, noise and cigarette smoke. This will affect much of the locality.'

I refer you to my previous replies where I explain the reality of what our venue environment is like, I think it is unfair for someone to move close to a pub and then make demands about cutting their trade even further, because we are so quiet in the week a good weekends trade helps like a good sunday afternoon with families or

Saturday night entertainment pre covid, with current licensing hours we had to turn that potential extra trade away, often to another venue close by who has 1am licensing.

11. The letter states -

'Article 8 of the human rights act states that - Everyone has the right to respect for his private and family life, his home and his correspondence'

I don't see how this applies here, if I moved next to an airport could I demand they can only do take offs at set times because it is affecting the locals? And I wonder is it against any rights to post a letter to residents with misinformation about a businesses intentions to generate a local irate response.

A few weeks ago I was at work on a Saturday, the sun was out and it was a good day, then customers became angry because someone from over the wall in the back garden was throwing/spraying water into the garden. It wasn't our fault that the customers were angry and shouting because someone was being malicious but I don't know who or where it came from. Landlord reported it to non emergency police line. Another time a while ago now, perhaps when we briefly reopened when covid rules were up and down, the neighbors in the terrace which is beside our small beer garden, had a relative visiting and they were parked in front of the gate entrance on pavement and that is our mobility scooter entrance. I had to go around and kindly ask them to move car because of mobility entrance although I was met with the response 'I'm not doing f\*\*\*\*\* anything for her', they later moved the car so things like this have happened that I know about.

I love my job, we are so much more than a pub, its a community all of its own, people need those things, especially those who dont have any family etc. I don't think a small minded person who doesn't personally know us and is spreading misinformation, should be able to post letters like this. Even the person who wrote the letter would be welcome to come visit, it is not our fault that they have a personal objection to public inn environments. In my opinion this persons malicious agenda should not be used to assess whether or not The Speedwell Inn should be granted licence extension because of how inaccurate and inappropriate it's composure and deliveries was.

I have been asked by my friends at the Speedwell Inn Laurie and Nicoleta Evans to email you in support of their licensing application after a rather negative campaign waged by one of their neighbours who has been pushing this anonymous letter through letterboxes of properties in the area. I have been using the Speedwell Inn as my local pub for forty plus years and have been a resident of Staveley all my life and can state that while Laurie and Nicoletta Evans have been running this establishment it has always been a well run and friendly village pub. Taking the points raised in the anonymous letter:

1. I am also a hardworking resident of Staveley who pays his Council Tax and I enjoy the friendly atmosphere of the Speedwell to unwind with my friends after my days labours. I Would think if I moved into a property adjoining licensed premises then I would not be surprised to find a certain nuisance level at nights when it was open. The most noise generated by the pub is a couple on Saturdays a month when live music is played, the rest of the time the pub is quite quiet as most of the pubs in the area will confirm.
2. There have been a few times when the odd van has parked on the pavement outside the front of the pub when groups have been loading and unloading and when one of or two of our infirmed customers have been helped into cars/taxis, etc but if it has been a problem the local police would have been informed and to my knowledge there are no reports that point to this being an issue. As to parking in general, most of the customers are local residents and so do not use their cars to visit the pub.
3. Are there reports "reports of alcohol-fuelled anti-social behaviour" because as stated previously I have personally not witnessed them? The odd person who has caused a slight problem and been asked to leave by Laurie but that happens in any establishment of this type from time to time.
4. I can't see where the patrons of the Speedwell would cause a big litter problem, if there is a litter problem it is more likely to come from the shop opposite, the Pizza takeaway a few yards up the road of the sandwich shop the other side of the bridge. There is also a large school down in the area with pupils walking to and from it.
5. From conversations with Nicoleta she has no plans to sell food on or off the premises but if they did the kitchen on the side of the pub which would open up onto a small road on the side of the pub and so "odour" would be not be a problem.
6. I would think the council would have done a risk assessment before planning the changes to Mallard Court and there is a large car park between the back of the Speedwell and the front of Mallard Court.
7. It is an offence to allow unaccompanied children in to a licensed premise so I don't see the problem any children I have seen in the pub have been accompanied by an appropriate adult and only and only at times when the pub has been quiet.
- 9 The noise from live music is monitored by the owners and is usually only twice a month on a Saturday night.
- 10 The designated smoking areas are surrounded by high walls so most of the smoke would be dissipated before it causes much of a problem. I feel I am more likely to get a health issue from the very sulfurous discharge from the chimney on the property

adjoining the pub, when the wind is in a certain direction than cigarette smoke. I am not sure what it is they are burning but I wonder whether it contravenes the clean air enforcement in this area.

As I stated at the top of my email the pub is a well-run establishment and in current times as a lot of pubs are under threat is a much loved local resource. The writer as partially quoted Article 8 the European Human Rights Act. Does this still apply as we are out of the European Union?



### **2<sup>nd</sup> Challenge MAN vs FOOD – Competition RULES:**


- Each competitor to eat 5 Hot Dogs in a bun in or under 3 minutes;
